KARL R. BRINKER, MD

Division of Nephrology, Baylor University Medical Center

Dr. Karl Brinker, age 58, died on January 22, 2005. He was born in Mount Pleasant, Michigan. After receiving his bachelor's degree in 1968 from the University of Michigan, he attended medical school at McGill University in Montreal, Quebec, Canada. From 1975 to 1977, he was in the US Public Health Service, serving with the Centers for Disease Control and Prevention in Fort Collins, Colorado. Afterwards, he completed a fellowship in nephrology at the University of Texas Southwestern Medical Center at Dallas. Dr. Brinker was on the medical staff at BUMC and Methodist Dallas Medical Center and was a clinical associate professor at UT Southwestern. In 2004, he took an educational sabbatical with the Division of Nephrology and Transplantation Immunology with Phillip Halloran, MD, PhD, at the University of Alberta in Canada. His hobbies included dry fly fishing, watching hockey, and coaching youth baseball.

GORDON M. CASWELL

Retired President, Baylor Health Care System Foundation

Gordon Caswell, 78, died on January 29, 2005. From 1983 to 1997, he served as president of the Baylor Health Care System Foundation, raising more than \$93 million. He helped raise funds for an expansion of women and children's services at Baylor University Medical Center, a 90,000-square-foot expansion of Baylor Regional Medical Center at Grapevine, the conversion of the former Gaston Episcopal Hospital to Baylor Institute for Rehabilitation at Gaston Episcopal Hospital, the expansion of the emergency department at Baylor Regional Medical Center at Grapevine, and the development of Our Children's House at Baylor. Born in Kingston, Ontario, Canada, in 1927, Mr. Caswell planned to be a minister and earned a degree from the Faith Theological Seminary in Philadelphia. He later earned a bachelor's

degree from the Roberts Wesleyan College in Rochester, NY. Mr. Caswell served as vice president of development for two private Christian liberal arts colleges from 1958 to 1973. In 1996, he was recognized with one of fundraising's top distinctions, the Laureate Award for the Major Gift Fundraiser of Distinction, and in 1998, Baylor awarded him its highest honor, the "Wings of Eagles" award. Mr. Caswell continued to train numerous attorneys, accountants, life insurance underwriters, investment brokers, real estate brokers, bankers, and financial planners throughout his career as president of Gordon M. Caswell & Associates, Inc. He was also a principal in the firm of Caswell, Zachry, Grizzard LLP of Dallas until his death.

NOAH HASKELL RANGE, MD

Department of Surgery, Baylor University Medical Center

Dr. Haskell Range died on December 27, 2004, at the age of 81. Born in Arkansas, Dr. Range attended high school in Donna, Texas, followed by Hardin-Simmons University and Tulane University Medical School. After a 1-year internship at Charity Hospital of Louisiana, he served as flight surgeon in the US Army Medical Corps from 1947 to 1949. He then completed his residency in surgery at the Veterans Affairs Hospital in McKinney and Parkland Hospital in Dallas. Dr. Range joined BUMC's medical staff in 1956 and trained many surgery residents through the years. He was also a clinical instructor of surgery at the University of Texas Southwestern Medical School. In 1979, Dr. Range served as president of the John Paul North Surgical Society. In addition, he was active in the Dallas County Medical Society, Texas Medical Association, and American College of Surgeons. For many years, he volunteered with the Boy Scouts of America, from whom he received the Frank Kidd Award. Dr. Range was a member of the First Baptist Church of Dallas.
