### **JUNE PELLET, RN**

#### ***Baylor University Medical Center***

June Smith Pellet died on May 19, 2005, at the age of 81. Mrs. Pellet was a long-time registered nurse and manager of the operating rooms at BUMC. She came to BUMC in 1947 and was the operating rooms' first director, remaining in that position from 1963 to 1976. Although Mrs. Pellet retired in the mid 1970s, she continued to contribute to nursing education, surgical suite design, and surgical product development for another decade. ### **DAVID D. REISMAN, MD**

#### ***Department of Urology, Baylor University Medical Center***

Born on January 4, 1919, in Detroit, Dr. David Reisman graduated at the top of his class from Wayne State University Medical School. He completed a residency in urology at the University of Texas Southwestern Medical School. During World War II, he was a captain in the US Army Medical Corps, serving in the Philippines. Dr. Reisman was a founder of Dallas Urology Associates and practiced medicine in Dallas and at Baylor University Medical Center for more than 50 years; he was also a clinical professor at UT Southwestern through his 80s. Dr. Reisman was an avid photographer and traveler. He died on February 11, 2005, at the age of 86.

### **WILLIAM H. WISNER, MD**

#### ***Department of Orthopaedic Surgery, Baylor Medical Center at Garland***

Dr. William Wisner died on March 13, 2005, at the age of 77. He was born in Grand Saline, Texas. After attending Tyler Junior College and East Texas State Teachers College, he graduated from the University of Texas Southwestern Medical School and trained at Baylor University Medical Center, the Dallas Veterans Administration Hospital, and the Crippled Children's Hospital in Birmingham, Alabama. Dr. Wisner was instrumental in establishing Baylor Garland's orthopaedic surgery department. He practiced surgery until 1996 and continued to see patients until his death. Dr. Wisner was also an avid flyer, logging more than 20,000 flying hours over his lifetime and flying around the world four times. He was a flight instructor and also a pilot for Delta Airlines during the 1950s.
